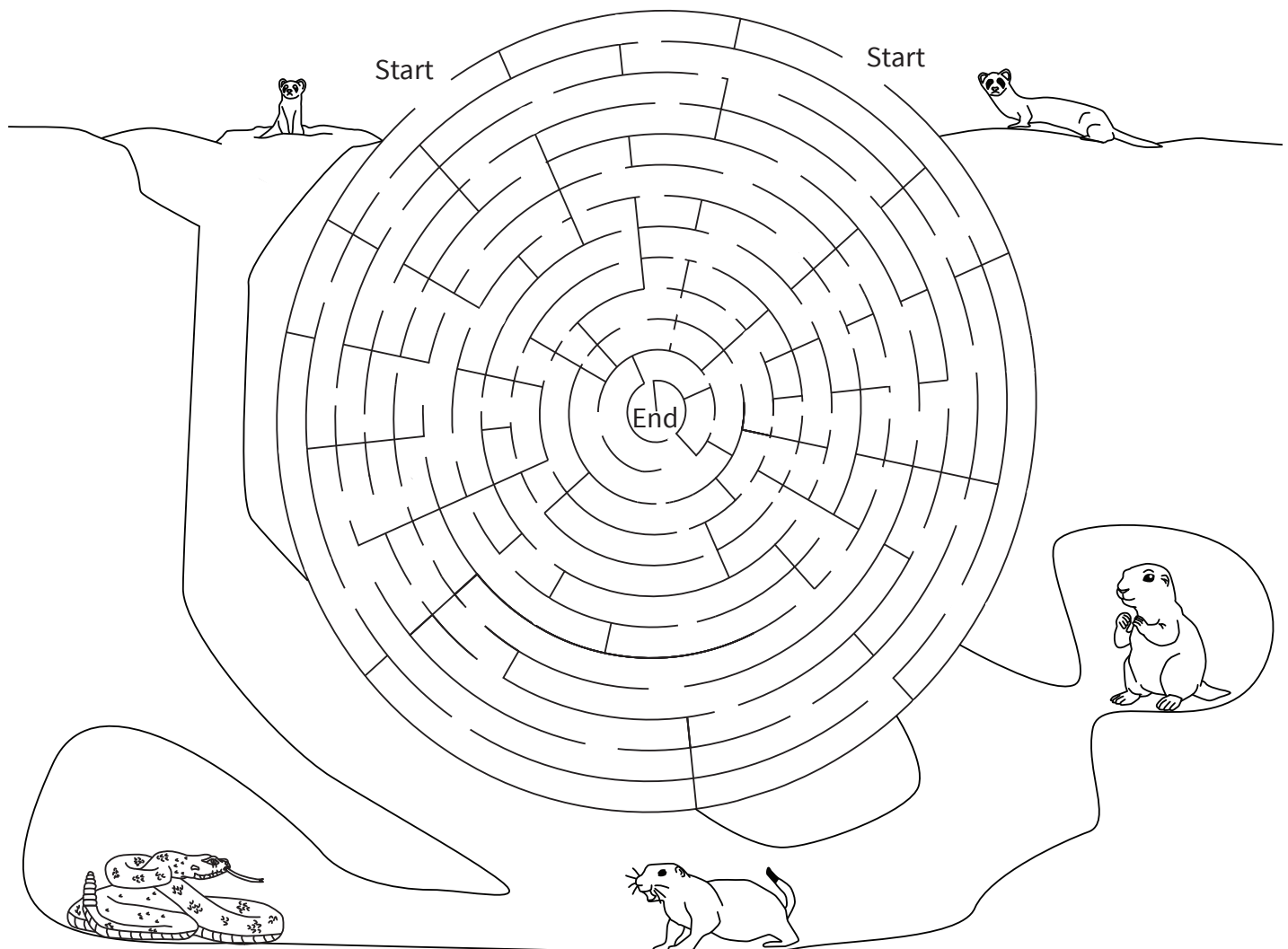
Cheyenne Mountain Zoo had a chameleon named Boy George, but after "he" laid eggs, she was renamed Girl George!

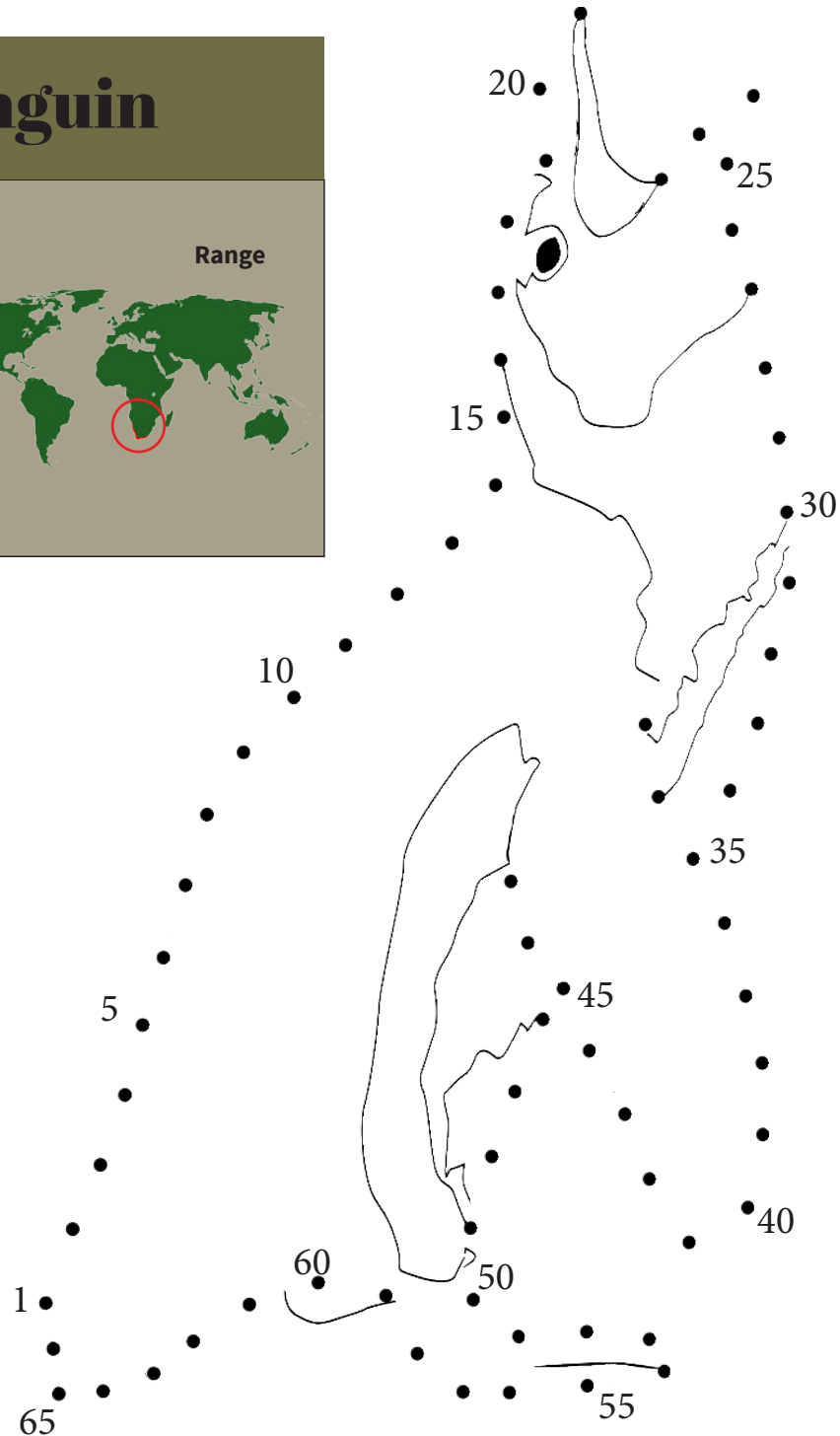
Connect-the-Dots

Draw the Spots

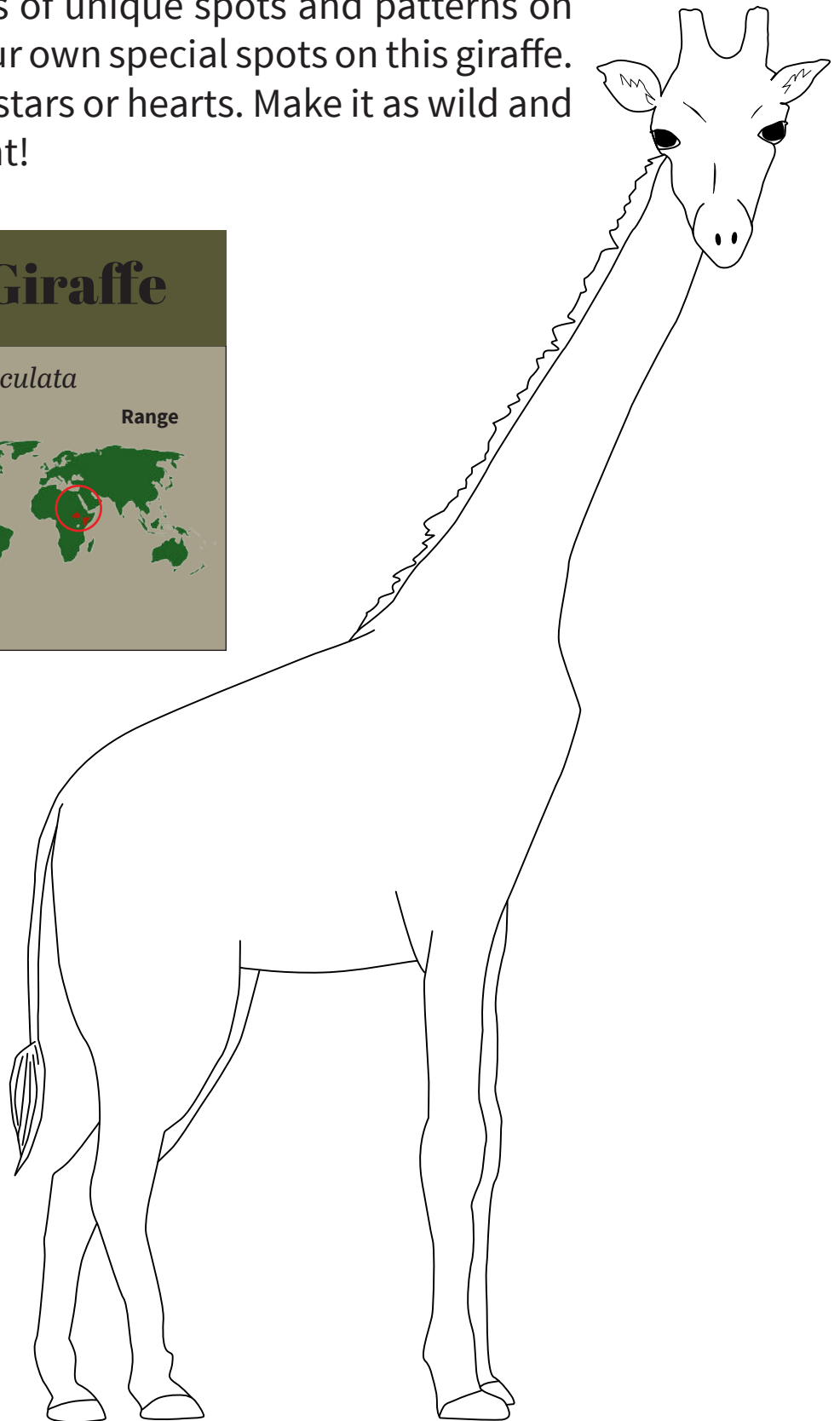

Giraffa camelopardalis reticulata

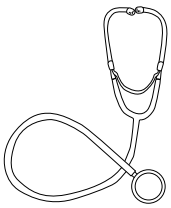

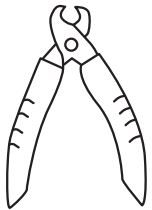


Be a Trainer!

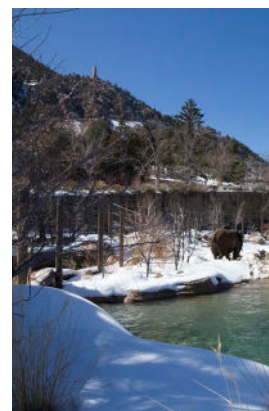
